Workforce Development



PHS connects those seeking training and employment opportunities with the horticultural and landscape industries. We provide training, job placement, and ongoing support throughout the year for Philadelphia residents impacted by underemployment. Our green industry workforce development programs offer paid training in the following areas:

PHS PENNSYLVANIA HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY®

- Basic horticulture and ecology
- Landscape maintenance & tree care
- Equipment operation and safety
- Light carpentry and masonry
- Green stormwater infrastructure (GSI)

The program also offers job readiness workshops that cover different topics including conflict resolution, health education, financial literacy, and occupational therapy. PHS provides continued support services and job placement with partnering employers upon graduation.

4.3% rise in value and a **13%** cumulative increase after **6 years** PHS uses gardening and landscaping to clean, green, and maintain vacant lots. Known as PHS Philadelphia LandCare, our team replaces waste with grass, trees, and plants in 12,000 lots to develop green spaces in urban areas.

With support from the City of Philadelphia, PHS partners with a network of contractors and community groups to turn vacant lots into a positive public green space. These spaces create lasting benefits including decreased gun violence and improved mental health.

Planting trees is a powerful way to enhance the health and well-being of neighborhoods. A "good" tree canopy coverage is considered to be 30% of land area — the city of Philadelphia only has 20% coverage and as little as 2.5% in some neighborhoods. The Pennsylvania Horticultural Society's Tree Tenders program works with volunteerbased community groups to plant trees in order to increase the canopy in neighborhoods with few trees and high average temperatures. The program provides workshops in tree planting and care and volunteer group organization.

Community gardens provide increased access to fresh, healthy produce throughout the region while simultaneously strengthening social connections between neighbors. The Pennsylvania Horticultural Society (PHS) supports community gardens by providing resources including educational workshops, gardening supplies and materials, seedlings, access to the PHS tool library, technical assistance, volunteer assistance, and infrastructure improvements.

Community gardens have the opportunity to participate in PHS's City Harvest initiative. PHS provides City Harvest gardens with access to seedlings and other inputs to ensure a successful growing season for donations. Participating gardens donate produce to local food pantries or share the crops with their community.

Community and cooperative gardens are assets to our cities because they provide increased access to fresh produce, elevate food sovereignty especially in under resourced or disenfranchised communities, build social cohesion, and preserve and celebrate cultures.

WEIGHT PENNSYLVANIA HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY: Flower Show



The Pennsylvania Horticultural Society's Philadelphia Flower Show showcases diverse and sustainable plant varieties, cutting-edge garden and design concepts, and stunning floral displays meant to inspire and educate attendees from around the world. The Flower Show hosts world-renowned competitions in horticulture and artistic floral arranging, gardening presentations, demonstrations, and special events.

Each year the Flower Show invites professional designers and gardeners to showcase their work. Educational exhibits are built by high school and university students, and exhibits from national plant societies can be experienced at the event. The Show also features the Hamilton Horticourt, where expert and novice gardeners compete for blue ribbons and exhibit their finest plants — much as the first exhibitors did in 1829. The Flower Show has blossomed into the nation's premier horticultural event — for almost 200 years it has been inspiring, educating, and encouraging visitors to join the diverse movement of people who garden and love plants.
